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Analysis of Readings

The two authors use their writings to communicate similar themes and issues pertaining to discrimination. In their works, they expose the societies they are brought up in pointing their stigmatization because of the English language they speak. In the first work, *The Joy of Reading and Writing: Superman and Me*, Alexie uses simple language. The writer chooses the simple language style for a number of reasons. First is to explain where he comes from and how he ends up being in love with books. In addition, he uses the language to identify people influencing him for the readers to understand how he learned to be a writer. With the help of his writing style, the author convinces the readers of his love for books and his origin. Moreover, Alexie attempts to make the readers understand that they always have to choose their own ambitions and be whom they want to be. In fact, he describes himself as arrogant. It is because he can do what he wants and not what others expect from him. Alexie addresses Indian kids who follow what others think of them. Thus, he persuades them resist the influence and be themselves.

In the second work, *Mother Tongue*, Tan uses simple English mixed with Chinese influenced English. The author uses this writing style to indicate the language she used while growing up. What is more, Tan explains the challenges she has gone through to be a writer. So, it enables the readers to understand her life as a writer. In addition, the language she uses describes her character. For example, when Tan expresses her disillusionment when she is

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personified as her mother. She abuses people. Consequently, the author also addresses immigrants regarding the difficulties they face. To sum up the reading, Tan provides an overview of the English she continues learning. She manages to learn different forms of English for her writing.

Comparing the two readings, it is possible to find similarities in addressing many problems that immigrants suffer from. Immigrants of different origin put up with social challenges to find their identities in American society. Firstly, in Alexie's work, the author risks discrimination, as he fails to embrace what the society anticipates him to be. He has to be arrogant by ignoring and opposing the community to become a writer. The author has to be brave in class and follow his rules. Secondly, in the second reading, Tan has to grow up in an environment where English from outside their community is not acceptable. The writer describes her mother's English as broken. Hence, both of the readings highlight the discrimination that representatives of ethnic and racial minorities endure to become who they are. To highpoint some examples in Alexie's essay, Indians are discriminated and supposed to be fools as opposed to their bright white counterparts. They are to remain submissive and live to the expectations of others. In Tan's essay reading, her mother faces discrimination because of the English she speaks. The author tells the readers that many people ignored her mother because of her broken English. The author has to ignore what others think of her English and write simply in order her mother could understand the daughter's books. In many ways, the two essays show how the authors tolerate discriminatory societies, fight the challenges, and rise to become writers. They act independently instead of becoming what others want them to be.
